It's my pleasure to present this year's President's Report on behalf of the Wildwood Community Association. Over the past year, our neighbourhood has continued to grow, adapt, and strengthen through the incredible work of volunteers, board members, and residents who care deeply about this place we all call home. Whether on the ice, in the garden, at a community café, or in a City Council hearing, Wildwood residents have shown up and contributed their time, energy, and ideas. Below are highlights from our collective efforts in 2024–25.

### **Board Operations & Administration**

Our board continued to meet monthly to guide the activities of the WCA, review community priorities, and respond to emerging issues. A special thanks to our Secretary, Lenora, who has worked diligently to streamline our communications and digital infrastructure. All meeting minutes have been properly recorded and stored according to our bylaws, and our Google Drive, contact lists, and email systems have been updated and maintained. These behind-the-scenes efforts ensure we remain transparent, organized, and responsive to our members.

### **Community Programs**

Wildwood's programming continues to thrive, offering families and residents of all ages the chance to connect and participate.

### **Youth Program Highlights:**

- Learn to Skate – 44 participants - Shinny Hockey – 54 participants
- Soccer – 198 participants
- Baseball – 46 participants

Our Playgroup continues to be a steady presence, and the Community Café, launched last year, has exceeded expectations for weekly attendance, becoming a popular gathering spot.

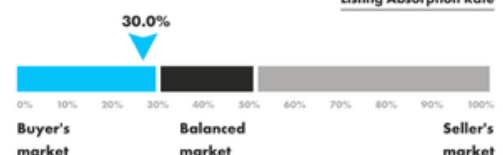

As expected, the Wildwood market has continued to show steady strength, moving into a Balanced Market for March 2025. The Benchmark Price for detached homes rose from \$849,500 in February to \$880,300 in March — an increase of 3.63% month-over-month. Compared to this time last year, prices are up 2.56%, with last March's Benchmark Price sitting at \$858,300.

The Listing Absorption Rate for March was 30%, which indicates a balanced dynamic between buyers and sellers. As of the end of March, there were 10 active listings, with 3 sales recorded for the month. When this was written on April 26th, inventory remained relatively stable, keeping Wildwood positioned for continued moderate price growth if demand picks up heading into late spring.

The official April numbers should be available by the 2nd or 3rd of May and will be posted on [www.WildwoodLife.ca](http://www.WildwoodLife.ca) by May 4th. # Wildwood Community Association News

A surge of pickleball players emerged in Wildwood this year, prompting the WCA to offer two drop-in sessions and lessons to help residents build their skills and enjoy the sport. It's been great to see this fast-growing sport take off in the community, and we plan to continue supporting it in the future. The Artisan Christmas Market was a major success this past holiday season, with sold-out vendor tables, a fantastic community turnout, and generous donations raised for the Calgary Food Bank. The Wildwood Playschool also held a successful fundraiser at the event. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, and we plan to build on this success next year.

## Community Garden

Our Garden Group had a fantastic year, marked by sustainability, education, and strong community engagement.

One of the most exciting milestones was receiving a TD Friends of the Environment grant, which will fund the conversion of six garden beds to self-watering wicking beds. A public build day is planned for May 10, and all are welcome to come learn and lend a hand. The grant also funded four tree care workshops and a community soil class led by Wildwood's own Chelsie Anderson from Soil-u-tions. In terms of harvest: the garden produced over 400 heads of garlic and several hundred pounds of potatoes, shared among members. Despite water restrictions last summer, the garden remained resilient thanks to swales, wicking beds, and our cistern system. The Harvest Festival was another highlight, drawing support from vendors, volunteers, and local sponsors. This year's event will be held on Saturday, September 6.

## Community Advocacy

Advocacy remained a key focus for the WCA this year, especially around zoning, traffic, and major infrastructure projects. The primary goal was to educate and inform our residents about the changes occurring within our city and community, ensuring they are aware of the impacts and can actively engage in decision-making processes.

## Zoning

On May 14, 2024 Calgary City Council approved a citywide rezoning initiative, upzoning all R-C1 and R-C2 lots to R-CG. These changes took effect August 6, 2024. The WCA continues to encourage residents to use DMap, the City's development tracking tool, to stay informed and contact file managers directly with questions about proposed developments. We've redirected many inquiries about new H-GO projects through this system.

## Traffic

The Spruce Drive Pathway Improvements Project, part of the Westbrook LAP, had its first engagement session in March 2025 and aims to improve pedestrian safety and connectivity in our community.

**Southbound signage on 37th Ave** leaving Spruce Cliff was updated after numerous 311 submissions. These changes have helped improve lane flow and reduce confusion and near-misses in the area.

**Bow Trail Interchange Project:** The WCA also participated in engagement sessions for the Bow Trail Interchange Project, which will affect traffic flow and infrastructure in our area. These sessions provided an opportunity for residents to ask questions, provide feedback, and stay informed about the potential impacts of this large-scale project.

## Community Events

This year, we saw the return and introduction of several key events that brought the neighbourhood together:

**Tour D'Wildwood Cycling Event:** A fun, family-friendly way to explore the community by bike. Great turnout and smiles all around.

**Stampede Breakfast:** In lieu of Neighbour Day, the WCA hosted a Stampede Breakfast in 2024, which was a highlight event for the community. We served traditional western fare, including pancakes, eggs, sausages, and fresh fruit. We had 200-300 attendees and planned for up to 500. It featured a live band and activities for kids, providing a wonderful opportunity for neighbours to reconnect and build new relationships in true Stampede spirit.

**Wildwood Cleanup:** As always, our annual cleanup helped beautify the neighbourhood while giving residents a chance to pitch in and reconnect.

**Broxburn Farms Produce Stand:** Throughout the spring and summer, we welcomed Broxburn Farms to the Community Centre each week, offering fresh local vegetables to residents. It was a great way to support local agriculture and increase food access in the neighbourhood.

## Financial Health

The WCA continued to strengthen its financial systems and long-term sustainability this year. Key accomplishments include:

- Successfully migrating to a cloud-based accounting system for improved efficiency and transparency
- Integrating our new program registration platform with financial reporting
- Managing our investments proactively and purchasing new GICs
- Completing our annual audit in record time
- Implementing a new budget system in QuickBooks

We ended the 2024/25 fiscal year with a net profit of approximately \$22,000, which we view as breaking even in practical terms when factoring in inflationary pressures on our operating account. We continue to take a conservative, responsible approach to budgeting while investing in our community.

## Looking Ahead

As we look toward the coming year, we remain focused on:

- Strengthening volunteer recruitment and engagement
- Continuing to support inclusive, accessible community programming - Advocating for thoughtful development and infrastructure
- Maintaining and improving our community spaces

## Thank You

## Community Groups: Edworthy Park Heritage Society

### Look Up, Way Up!

Readers may remember our comments from previous years that Bald Eagles are sometimes seen in mid-March as they soar over the Edworthy/Shaganappi escarpment. This spring we again saw a pair. Although some eagles overwinter in Calgary, they are usually in the southeast end of the city. We think the eagles we see in March are stopping over for a few days on their migration.

The Bald Eagles arrived a little later than usual — this year they came about the end of March and stayed during the first week of April. It is so incredible to live where we can see these magnificent creatures. Bald Eagles almost went extinct after World War II. The Baby Boomer generation rarely if ever saw any Bald Eagles hovering over the park. By the early 2000s, for several reasons, the species had recovered from the brink of extinction. So we are especially thrilled again to see them circling and soaring over the escarpment. Some of our neighbours saw an eagle flying low through the airspace over their yard.

Historically, Bald Eagles were (and still are) considered sacred by the First Nations, as embodying wisdom, strength, honour, courage. They fly so high in the sky that they are closest to the Creator. Born in 1904, George First Rider, famous Blood (Kainai) horseman and rodeo man, was a well-known storyteller and knowledge keeper of Blackfoot culture and beliefs. In an interview, he described "The Significance and Functions of the Eagle in Blackfoot Ceremonialism". We recommend reading a transcript of it online at [ourspace.uregina.ca](http://ourspace.uregina.ca).

Elder George First Rider described various uses of an eagle that included: the tail feathers were used as ceremonial regalia and in straightup headpieces, and medicine hats; the collarbones for whistles; the left wing for a fan; and the claws for necklaces. People had to be qualified in order to have the privilege of using the precious properties of the eagle for various sacred items. There are many words in Blackfoot that originate from eagles. One refers to the "graceful cruise of eagle in midair" and is given a Blackfoot name meaning "Softly Graceful Cruising".

Indeed, the Bald Eagle we saw was gracefully cruising above the escarpment. When the eagle came lower and circled over the cliff, we were able to get a photo. Historically, in Wildwood, there was an "eagle pit" where the First Nations would put out bait on logs that covered a pit while a person would hide below waiting for an eagle. When one landed, the person below would reach up and pluck a tail feather from it. The eagle pit that was in Wildwood is mentioned in the Memoirs of George Edward Edworthy, and other information is included in the Society's book *Shaganappi Point and Edworthy Park: a New History*.

For more information on Blackfoot culture, we refer you to a series of educational videos about Blackfoot Bird Knowledge, Teepees, Introduction to Plants, and other topics just made available to rent online for \$5.95 each. Elder Sheldon First Rider, grandson of George whom we have quoted above, is instrumental in creating these videos and the team of elders and filmmakers will also be interviewing elders. To rent the short but excellent videos, search [blackfoothistory.ca](http://blackfoothistory.ca). There you may also obtain information about the Blackfoot Language Revival program and courses.

In other news, two neighbours have heard the Great Horned Owl in the Douglas-fir trees on the escarpment. One neighbour heard it calling at midnight. On April 5th, the first Mourning Cloak butterflies were seen. The catkins are coming out on the Aspen trees. The robins are back. The crocuses are about to bloom. And on April 9th, a neighbour reported seeing a rather scruffy moose crossing the street. In the spring, moose molt their heavy winter coats. By the time you read this, the trees will be in leaf, migratory warblers will be passing through, and spring will truly have arrived. We hope you enjoy springtime walks in the park and the neighbourhood.

P.S. A neighbour reported seeing two bobcats on Wildwood Drive — the bobcats "hopped up to the top of a fence" and then jumped into a backyard. Please watch out for your pets. The population explosion of wild hares and rabbits provides plentiful food not only for bobcats but also for coyotes, hawks, great-horned owls, and eagles all of which may also catch your pets.

### Create a beautiful and resilient YardSmart yard!

A YardSmart yard stays beautiful longer during hot and dry weather compared to yards completely planted with grass. The City's YardSmart program provides helpful resources that show you how to plan, build, and maintain your yard, including:

- How-to videos including how to garden on a budget and creating a pollinator friendly yard.

Remember, new plants need lots of water to get established, especially during the heat of summer. You can do your part to reduce your water consumption and help your yard and garden retain moisture by:

- Installing a rain barrel to use in your yard and garden. It is a simple, yet effective way to reduce your water use by acting as a backup source of water.
- Adding good quality soil to help retain moisture and mulch on top to reduce evaporation.
